The 24 girls, aged between 9 and 14, got to make their own lunch over an open fire and finished off the meal sampling a fondue made from cocoa beans sent from St Lucia that were roasted over a BBQ and hand ground.

The day proved to be a real community event that will help the wildlife of Goring.

From there we walked to Westminster Abbey where we were met by our guide, who first led a craft workshop for the girls so they could make crowns, that they then wore as we toured the abbey. The girls loved learning about the coronation chair and its long history, hearing about some of the famous people who have memorials in poets' corner, sitting in the choir stalls looking out at the place the coronation would take place and visiting the memorial to Lord and Lady Baden Powell. They asked lots and lots of questions!

From Westminster Abbey we walked to Westminster Pier where we caught a river boat along the Thames to Tower Bridge and back, enjoying the commentary and spotting more famous landmarks.

Once back at Westminster Pier, we walked to Pizza Express for tea and on the way caught up with a group of 50 guides, rangers and leaders from Scotland who were spending the week in London - they were booked into Pizza Express at the same time as us so the group area was filled with Girlguiding members.

After tea we walked back to ICANDO for a relaxed evening, writing up log books, playing games and doing London-themed crafts before hot chocolate and then bed!

We were up early ready for breakfast, making of packed lunches and spending some time enjoying the activity boxes supplied by ICANDO before leaving to walk to Victoria Underground Station to catch the tube to the Tower of London. As we walked towards the tower, we saw the Girlguiding group from Scotland again and, as we waited for our entry time (we had both booked for 10.30!), a spontaneous joint singing games session entertained the other visitors in the area. Once in the Tower of London, the girls enjoyed visiting the Crown Jewels, exploring the ramparts, watching the entertainments,

Invited to watch the Coronation!



Hello, my name is Charlotte, and I am a Girlguiding Advocate, which means that I represent Girlguiding at events and share their views to major decision makers around the country.

Girlguiding has quite a history with the Royal Family - the late Queen enjoyed her time as a Guide as a member of the 1st Buckingham Palace Guides and so did Princess Margaret as a Brownie. HM The Queen was also our patron from 1952 up until she passed away last year.

For the King's Coronation, Girlguiding had 150 volunteers all round London working as stewards and way-finders, and lots of units also got involved on the Monday afterwards in the Big Help Out. However, the Advocate panel and some other youth panels at Girlguiding, such as the young leader working group and Amplify, got invited to attend a special private screening in the small white chapel next to Westminster Abbey called St Margret's Church. This is where 400 young people from selected charities such as NCS, St John Ambulance and the Scout Association watched the live screening of the Coronation.

We all got invited to have breakfast and lunch at Lambeth Palace as well. The food was served in a 'bake-off style' tent in the garden which guests could take a stroll around, it really was such a beautiful garden. At lunch, the Archbishop of Canterbury came along to speak to all the young

people who had been invited and I managed to get a photo with him.

One of my favourite moments was seeing the Coronation procession as it left the Abbey. We were all let out of the Church early to be escorted to the railings right outside Westminster Abbey, so that we could all get a front row view of the golden coach. It was striking and beautiful as it rolled past us, and the King and Queen gave us all a wave as they came past. It was extremely special as they were so few people there, the Abbey guests not being allowed to leave just yet, and it really felt like the Royals were looking directly at you.

It was an amazing day and I felt honoured to have been invited to represent Girlguiding, the largest UK organisation dedicated solely towards girls and young women, as it is such an amazing thing for all girls no matter where they come from to be a part of. All the young guests got a tote bag with the Coronation symbol on it containing an order of service, invitation, and special pin badge to go on our badge tabs.
